2023 Summit Goals

The Baltimore Together Summit aimed to achieve the following goals:

- Align stakeholders around a shared vision and understand key metrics, including citywide goals and objectives.
- Highlight the great work that is happening around economic, workforce and community development in Baltimore City.
- Tie together various economic, workforce and community development activities into one coherent platform and community narrative.
- Expand the opportunities for participants to identify specific actionable next steps and take responsibility and accountability for implementation.

Overview

Building on the success of the inaugural 2022 Baltimore Together Summit, the 2023 Summit served as a celebratory touchpoint and galvanizing moment to continue the critical work of building an inclusive, equitable and thriving economy for all. The weeklong Summit started with Day 1 at the M&T Bank Exchange, a newly renovated historic venue within the France-Merrick Performing Arts Center at the Hippodrome. The Summit started with opening remarks from Mayor Brandon Scott and a highlight reel introduced by BDC President & CEO Colin Tarbert, sharing the great work that Baltimore Together has accomplished over the past year.

Baltimore Together calls all of us to engage in creative solutions, collaborative efforts, and new ways of working, investing in people, places and infrastructure. Today we get to celebrate that great work.

2nd Annual Summit 2023



Dr. Andre Perry from the Brookings Institute delivered the morning keynote address outlining the devaluation of assets in Black neighborhoods. He highlighted how "the perceptions of our neighborhoods are affecting the perceptions of the businesses that exist within them, regardless of the true quality of those businesses." Our city's commercial corridors are typically the first impression of our communities, and they contribute significantly to the perceived value of a community. Dr. Perry also outlined a solution to this devaluation, which directly aligns with the core pillars of Baltimore Together: invest in people, invest in places, and divest from racism. Dr. Perry provided an example of this strategy as partnering with businesses and developers to incentivize the renovation of neighborhood commercial buildings and to provide incentives for Black and brown business owners to own the commercial buildings in which they operate. He closed his remarks by sharing a story that illuminated the importance of Working Together, one of the four key pillars outlined in Baltimore Together.

There is no way to get the kind of growth in Baltimore that we need without us working together: private sector, public sector, nonprofit sector...you have to work together. - Dr. Andre Perry

The remainder of Day 1 included a series of panels and presentations highlighting a series of topics all related to the work of Baltimore Together. In addition, Maryland Comptroller Brooke Lierman provided remarks on the importance of Baltimore Together and how she is working to improve MBE/WBE procurement at the state level. Feedback was very positive from participants (both in person and virtually) on the diversity of speakers and topics, showing the breadth and depth of Baltimore Together.

In the afternoon, Dave Bramble of MCB Real Estate and Vaki Mawema of Gensler led a segment entitled, "The Future of Harborplace," where they revealed for the first time initial concepts and plans in detail for the redevelopment of Harborplace. The work of redeveloping this critical piece of Downtown was explicitly outlined in the Baltimore Together Action Matrix in several places: "Invest in Baltimore's Downtown" (2.20 -2.23), "Hospitality and Tourism" section (3.27 -3.35) and Compete to Succeed section (4.4) "Market Baltimore's Downtown Center as a place to live, work, and play."

The Summit also engaged Baltimore's youth through a spoken word performance from a Coppin State University student and Heartbeat Young Elder. Videos produced by Wide Angle Youth Media highlighting individual stories and community impact were shown throughout the day.



- Workforce Development in partnership with the Mayor's Office of Employment Development
- Talent Attraction and Retention in partnership with the GBC
- Crafting and sharing our collective narrative and brand on both local and national platforms

In addition to the previously-listed activities and videos, we published a Baltimore Together Progress Report, highlighting the progress made on each of the 7 key goals of Baltimore Together.

At the end of Year 2, and as part of this progress report we also published an update to the Implementation Matrix. This update shows positive progress on 48% of the 99 action items outlined in the original matrix. The Annual Summit serves as a touchpoint and key gathering space for the community, but the work of Baltimore Together continues all year through big and small initiatives led by a wide-range of partners. The update reports help provide accountability and collective buy-in towards our shared goals (as outlined in sub strategies 1.1 - 1.3 in the implementation matrix).


